DESERT SENNA



This month, we are learning all about the Desert Senna (Senna covesii). Here are a few fun and key facts:

- Desert Senna is a member of the pea or legume plant family; however, its seeds and leaves are used as a potent laxative rather than a food source like other legumes.
- It is a buzz-pollinated plant often by bees and is a larval host plant of multiple species of sulfur butterflies.
- It is a hardy, perennial plant that grows in full sun. In the dry seasons, it goes dormant and looks dead until it rains again.
